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Excess

The parable of the prodigal son is among one of those most cited of Jesus' parables. It is to be found in works of art, morality plays, operas and ballets — and popular music, including rap, heavy metal and U2! It is one of those parables that is able to 're-invent' itself in order to 'speak' into changing times and circumstances.

The parable has been the subject of both classical and contemporary art. Paul Rubens' depiction focusses on the son as a swineherd (https://www.1st-art-gallery.com/ Peter-Paul-Rubens/Return-Of-The-Prodigal-Son-C.-1618.html). There in the foreground, a little difficult to see, is a trough, three pigs, a sow with a couple of piglets. Much more visible are cattle and horses and a seventeenth-century barn. A young woman is pouring feed into the trough, while the younger son looks up at her, a little worse to wear, no shoes, his trousers tattered and cut off just above the knee, his chest bare except for a little bit of left-over shirt. He has squandered his inheritance.

Through his use of light and dark Rembrandt fastens upon the theme of 'The Return of the Prodigal Son' (http:// www.rembrandtpainting.net/rembrandt% 27s prodigal son.html). The art historian Kenneth Clark reckoned it to be the greatest painting ever painted. The son has come home in a wretched state; no shoes again, his clothes are tatty and devoid of bright colour. He kneels before his father in the manner of servant and is forgiveness. The father's hands touch the son with a gentle gesture compared with the colourfully adorned elder brother whose hands are crossed in judgement. In the background, almost out of sight, is a figure who does not feature in the parable - a woman, is it the son's mother?

Hands play an important part in Guercino's depiction of the moment when the younger son is being given fresh robes to wear (https://www.wga.hu/support/viewer_m/z.html). The son is naked from the waist up

as his father and a servant help him with this dressing and offering a pair of shoes. The focus is not on eyes and that line of sight in this painting: it falls on the hands – the hands that help, the hands that touch the one who has been lost, and the right hand of the father which curves around the son's back in a sign of affection and welcome.

The modern work of Bertram Poole is very different. The father is making his way joyfully to greet his son. He is running down a pathway full of colour and evidence of wealth. It is almost hard to notice a smaller shadowy figure back at the house — presumably the elder brother. On the left hand side of the work are a number of pigs, signs of poverty, the son himself scantily clothed and without shoes. He has just stepped out of the gloom onto a golden pathway which forms itself into a striking cross (https://fineartamerica.com/featured/prodigal-son-parable-painting-by-bertram-poole-thomas-bertram-poole.html).

The way in which the parable can be interpreted is one of its enduring features. In some recent theology the son's desire for his inheritance and his subsequent lifestyle is seen as an indictment on excess and a neglect of concern for future generations. That the son ends up in a pigsty is a of Pope Francis' encyclical, reminder Laudato Si', on the care of our common home: the Pope reckons that our throwaway society ends up trashing the Earth - and, just like the prodigal son, humanity needs 'to come to its senses' and return to way of life where God is honoured along with God's good creation – the Earth.

What begins with an excess of indulgence on the part of the son ends with an excess of love from the father.

Lent 5

Philippians 3: 4b-14, John 2: 1-8

Theme: Anointing

Today we anoint our leaders through the ballot box and the oaths of office they take. They will have come to office via a campaign, a number of well-timed, well-place election promises. They will have kept an eye on the latest polls: they will have managed 'appearances' and will have been subjected to media interviews and comments on social media. In the case of Jesus Mary anoints him in the house of Lazarus. This act of anointing is lost on Judas – all he sees is the expense. In terms of the gospel the anointing highlights two things: a king or a messiah was anointed with oil. This act of anointing is also in preparation for Jesus' death on the cross and his burial in the empty tomb. Jesus is 'anointed' into his position through the imagery of a suffering king. Rather than happening in an election night party it happens in the presence of the one who will betray him.
