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The Line of Abraham (and Sarah!)

The Hebrews reading is designed to furnish examples of how the biblical tradition bears witness to faith over many generations. Our text fastens upon Abraham, his setting out not knowing where he was to go, and the promise made to his descendants. The missing verses (4-7) refer to Abel, Enoch, and Noah. Though Abraham and Sarah are 'as good as dead' there comes a line to which Jews, Christians and Muslims lay claim. The way in which these three religions seek to relate to one another today is often through conversations surrounding Abraham: they are the Abrahamic faiths.

The Luke reading follows on from the parable of the rich fool. It offers an alternative understanding of how to live from the fool who was rich in wealth but poor to God. Jesus bids his hearers not to worry about the basics of life: food, shelter and clothes. In a link back to the parable he declares that worrying cannot add an extra span to your life. He invites them to store up their treasure in heaven and be ready for the son of man who comes like a thief in the night. Once again the comparison can be made with the rich fool: he set himself up 'to eat, drink and be merry' but that very night he died.

Some History:

The Christian faith has a long and fascinating history. It is probably the case that most churchgoers these days are fairly unfamiliar with that past and how it can assist us in the present. Rather than get bogged down in a particular period it can be an interesting task to take time over a readable survey. One such book is Tom Holland's *Dominion: How the Christian Revolution Remade the World* (New York: Hachette Books, 2019). It dips into the past with a lightness of touch and presents a human face to conflicts, controversies and hopes. Over the next few weeks I will introduce you to some of the characters he writes about.

One of those early figures was Irenaeus. He lived in Lyon (in France) during the second century. The period in which he lived was initially free of the persecutions that had troubled an earlier generation. It was true that those who bore the name of Christ had to deal with the gossip and 'fake news' of their fellow citizens who believed all sorts of strange things that happened in church circles. And then-in 177-the relative peace was ruptured as Christians seemed reluctant to take part in civic rituals of sacrifices to Caesar. Some were thrown into prison; some into the amphitheatre to face wild animals. In reply to every inquiry as to who he was by the interrogators, one man simply repeated 'I am a Christian'.

But the contemporary situation could often give rise to some strange ideas within those who were seeking to follow Christ in tough times. One woman, Blandina, was sure that Jesus on the cross had somehow been spared and a passer-by had died in his place. Others wondered whether the Old Testament / Hebrew Bible was really needed in the yet-to-be finalized Christian Scriptures. And there were those in the east who sought to convert the Christian faith into the likeness of the mystery religions found in the Greek-speaking world

In response to what was happening Irenaeus realized the need for members of the church to have a clear understanding of what is the gospel and be able to refute ideas that were not worthy. One of the most important books of the early church was his Against the Heresies- the Greek word for heresy means 'a choice'. It was a rejection of the beliefs of those who laid claim to a 'secret wisdom' that would become the preserve of those who thought of themselves as 'knowing ones' (gnostics), a spiritual elite. Irenaeus helped preserve 'the rule of faith'—that is, the basic outline of Christian belief that has lasted through to this day. In the face of the challenges of his day Irenaeus declared that Christ had come for 'all men [and women] who feared and loved God ... [and wished. to] act justly'.

We are indebted to him: Pope Francis declared him to be a 'doctor of the church' on the 21 January 2022.

The Hebrews reading begins with that familiar reference to a 'great cloud of witnesses'. It is referring back to those characters prior to Jesus who were examples of faith. It is like a survey of Old Testament history—though told in a patriarchal way. The turn of phrase is interesting. Stanley Hauerwas has been a notable Christian ethicist / thinker about what it means 'to be' a church. He was asked about how his understanding of faith had been formed and referred to 'testament of friends'. а Some he knew in person, some he did not. Some had lived well back in the past but he was conscious that he stood in their line and their witness had helped shaped him, perhaps in a way he did not realize. The passage continues with the metaphor of being in a race: at face value the cloud of witnesses might also suggest a crowd at a sporting spectacle. it is not a sprint. lt requires perseverance. Jesus is deemed be the 'pioneer' and 'perfecter' of this faith. The word for pioneer in Greek

can also be translated as prince or captain.

The gospel reading follows in from some rather fiery language and conflict within the household. This Jesus is the cause of division. We have here the only weather report in the gospels. Living the Middle East the in people know what to expect if the wind comes from the south or the west. In ancient times it was often thought that weather was the 'gift' of God. If the weather was fine, then you were blessed; if the weather was stormy you must have done something wrong. Our understanding of weather and climate is now more professionalized and mathematically based. Jesus believes that the crowds know how to read the weather but not the signs of the times. The word for times here is kairos. It is not the same as *chronos* from which we get chronology and an understanding of time broken up into hours, days, weeks etc. Kairos time is different: it is the time, the opportune time, God's time.
