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# 27 November 1st Sunday in Advent: The coming (again) of Christ.

### Christmas Bowl: Candle of Hope.

#### Isaiah 2:1-5 Matthew 24: 36-44

O come, O come, Emmanuel ..... For over 1200 years that refrain from the well-known Advent carol is sung. Our version dates from 1851; originally the text was in Latin and was sung in monasteries 7 days out from Christmas Eve. There are many versions of this familiar carol these days – from formal cathedral choirs, through to the Cambridge Singers and their John Rutter version, to Chris Tomlin, semi-jazz versions – and The Piano Guys on piano and cello.

O come, o come, Emmanuel ... It is particularly apt for us to sing this carol this year as we change scripts, leaving behind Luke and placing ourselves in the care of Matthew. Only in Matthew is there any reference to this name / title Emmanuel which has been taken from Isaiah.

There is a common default position that occurs at this time of year: sometime Advent and Christmas begin to collapse into one another. That is a pity as the two seasons are really quite distinct. It can be helpful then to notice the readings that are set down. They can help keep us 'honest'. It is rather strange in some way that every year our readings for Advent come from towards the end of the gospel for the year rather than the beginning. That is because Advent is a season when we approach (again) the Christmas stories and also because Advent has to do with the expectation that Christ will come again.

The spirituality of the Advent season is often signified by the call to be 'watchful', to expect, to hope. Our Matthew reading for this week likens the coming of the Son of Man (Jesus) to the days of Noah. In the early church the Noah cycle played a more prominent role in understanding the gospel than it does today. In a way the Noah imagines a -'re-set': in these stories from the early chapters of Genesis God begins again with a new humanity and a rainbow covenant with 'all flesh'. The second coming of Christ presumes the fulfilment of hopes that the kingdom of God that he proclaimed will be fully realized. The Noah saga nevertheless carries words of warning: Noah's advice to his fellows is ignored; he prepares for the floods that will come but they disregard these gloomy prophecies and do not turn away from their wrongdoing and turn again to God.

Our reading from Matthew captures something of that apocalyptic mood when the purposes of God break in unexpectedly on a seemingly unprepared humanity. Life, like it was in the time of Noah, was carrying on 'normally' ... But the apocalyptic breaks in ... We might say that the way in which the shops make ready for Christmas, the end of the year, the prospect of preparing for holidays and the like is our equivalent of going things 'as in the days of Noah'.

It is a standard convention for the Advent New Testament readings to be accompanied by verses from the book of Isaiah. This book is written over an extended period of time and falls into three parts. The Advent / Christmas readings tend to come from the first part, the Easter readings from the second, the season of Pentecost from the third. In this reading from (first) Isaiah there is an expectation of people 'from all nations' (an Isaiah trait) seeking out the ways of the Lord and the prospect of an end to war. The Isaiah reading presents a counterbalance to the apocalyptic urgency found in Matthew. In days of impending difficulty the prophet bids the people to 'come, let us walk in the light of the Lord'. There is here the hope for a worldwide rule of God, but - for the moment – the people of Israel will need to negotiate defeat at the hands of the Assyrians.





# **Advent Studies for this year**

The coming Season of Avent in the Christian calendar commences on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> November. We traverse from a gospel year in Luke into a year featuring Matthew.

This means that we move from a year featuring gentiles and the needy to a focus on Jewish people, the chosen people of God as viewed by Matthew.

We will be engaged in Three studies this advent, at weekly intervals.

The first will be led by Clive Pearson who will provide us with much food for thought. He will draw comparisons between the Advent story of Christmas as presented by both Matthew and Luke and provide some clues about what will follow in Matthew as we explore this Gospel in 2023.

Drawing on the information provided by Clive, the following two weeks of the study will be led by Michael Strong and will first involve reflections on the events leading up to the birth of Jesus. The second will consider the entry of Herod and horrid actions he inflicted on male children in Bethlehem and the flight of Jesus and his family to Egypt. This exploration will continue through to the exchanges between John the Baptist and Jesus.

# Being prepared for next week's worship:



4 December 2022 Advent 2 Peace

**Theme:** 'Prepare the way of the Lord'. Christmas Bowl: Candle of Peace

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Sunday 4 December: 8am, 9:30am & 6:45pm Bible Readings: Isaiah 11:1-10 Matthew 3:1-12 In the gospel of Luke the births of John the Baptist and Jesus run in parallel to one another. That is made plain most especially in Mary's visitation to Elizabeth – but that is not the case in Matthew. The first appearance of John is in the wilderness of Judea proclaiming repentance: he is described as the one who is fulfilling the prophecy of (second) Isaiah (with a little bit of Malachi and Exodus thrown it): in its original setting (several hundred years before the time of Jesus) that voice in the wilderness would not have imagined this description being applied to John the Baptist. The leaders of Israel have been carried away into exile in Babylon: the (first) Temple is in ruins. Now the hope of new beginning is dawning. By way of an aside Handel made use of the King James' Version's reading of Isaiah 40:1-5 in *The Messiah*.

The first century Jewish historian, Josephus, makes mention of Joseph (who was a 'good man and commanded the Jews to exercise virtue'. John is also held in high regard in Islam (under the name of Yahya) where he is told to hold fast to the Scriptures and received wisdom while still a child. He was 'kind to his parents and neither arrogant nor disobedient'.

In the gospel of Matthew John's ministry is one of baptism for repentance and a forerunner of 'the one coming after me'. It is anticipating

> the coming of the as yet not. Named Jesus. There is a divisive edge to this account, however, that warns the reader of the impending conflict between 'the one who is to come' and the Pharisees and the Sadducees. This is the first reference to them in this gospel. Why the Sadducees especially came out to John in the wilderness feels a little unusual as they were more bound to the Temple, Jerusalem, and something of an elite. John describes them as a brood of vipers, perhaps a reference back to the serpent in the garden of Eden.

> The Isaiah reading set down for this week is taken from (first) Isaiah. In the midst of this talk of wilderness, repentance and vipers the Isaiah text provides a shoot for something rather different – the possibility of a peaceful kingdom that embraces the whole of nature. The 'stump of Jesse' refers to David – and, by extension due the way in which the term the son of David is applied in the gospels becomes a reference to Jesus. There is no equivalent in Matthew of Luke's account of 'the spirit of the Lord' being upon Jesus as he reads from the synagogue in his town: this Isaiah passage nevertheless has the spirit of wisdom, understanding, counseling, might, knowledge and fear of the Lord. It fulfils a somewhat similar purpose.
