

(Not Happy!)

Bible Readings:

Micah 6:1-8 Matthew 5:1-12



The 'sermon' is one of the most well-known portions of Scripture. It has a history of reception. For many churchgoers it is one of their favourite texts; for Mahatma Gandhi the sermon on the mount was almost enough for him, a Hindu, to convert to the Christian faith; for Karl Marx, on the other hand, it was the reverse: it kept people satisfied with their lot and willing to accept oppressive structures. It was a text for the weak. For Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German martyr killed near the end of the war, it lay at the heart of the way in which he taught students to 'confess' the Christian faith over and against the Nazi propaganda. The sermon on the mount led to one his most studied books, *The Cost of Discipleship*.

With this kind of reception there is some need to pay attention to the text itself – what is it saying and how does it compare with equivalents elsewhere. The most obvious comparison is with 'the sermon on the plain' in Luke: here there are some woes that are not be found in Matthew and also it reads 'blessed are poor' and 'blessed are the hungry'. Matthew takes a more 'spiritual' rather than 'physical line', writing 'blessed are the poor in spirit' and 'blessed are those who hunger after righteousness'.

The way in which Matthew tells the gospel there are many parallels to the experience of the people of Israel. Some of the time this habit is well-signposted; there are repeating phrases like 'this was to fulfil'. On other occasions the parallels are more implied. That is the case with the sermon on the mount. It echoes Moses going up Mt Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments. The way in which the Torah (the Law) was organized in the Hebrew Bible is mirrored in the layout of Matthew's gospel. There are 5 blocs of teaching in Matthew which

reflects the 5 books of the Torah (called the Pentateuch).

The word for 'blessed' in Matthew is *makarios*. It does not mean 'happy' (as you will find in some translations). It is not the biblical equivalent of Pharrell Williams' song, 'Be happy'! Being happy is a subjective, emotional state. It is how we feel. Being blessed, being on the receiving end of *makarios*, is a God-given gift. It comes from without. It is, in fact, far from easy to see how 'happy' works in the translation of the sermon as the individual beatitudes reflect the very opposite of what we might expect. That this should be so has led some biblical commentators to describe the beatitudes as 'strenuous commands' that can only be realized in the fulfilled kingdom of God (note Matthew uses the term kingdom of heaven, as a Jewish readership would have some reservations about using the name of God!

This reading from the gospels is accompanied this Sunday by one of the most well-known readings from the prophets—that is, Micah 6:1-8. In response to the plight of the people at the onset of the Assyrian invasion a series of four questions are posed with regards how they should present themselves before the Lord/YHW. The way of sacrifices is rejected: the people ('mortal') know what is good and what is required: 'to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.

One way of approaching the Beatitudes in our day is to consider (i) examples of those who seem to bear witness to a particular blessing in his/her life; and, ii). are their aspects of life today that were not so apparent in the first century that might justify a contemporary beatitude? What form might that take?
