



Something to think about

LENT 2

Lectionary Readings:

Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18 Psalm 27 Philippians 3:17-4:1 Luke 13:31-35

Both/And Rather than Either/Or

It is amazing that in God we discover a breaking from boxes and boundaries. God stretches our understanding and opens us to the reality of complexity and the enigmatic nature of truth. This is not to say that there is no such thing as truth, it is just that it lies with God and not always within the limited reach of our understanding. This often leads to discomfort and tends to upset religion which has a tendency towards a degree of rigidity and conformity to an order. However, in Christ, who is God and through God who is Spirit, who is at work in us and with us, we have freedom which comes from faith which brings us into the wonder of grace.

Too often we want things to be nice and neat. This is in terms of our physical environments but also applies a lot to our thinking. We like things to fit into categories and compartments which require us to think less. However, this usually leads us to judging more. "Either/or" thinking can be simple and comfortable. There is here or there, us or them, in or out and one that is a favourite of human[un]kind which is right or wrong. To maintain this seems to require a

simple logic, where we have rules or classifications or standards and then we simply apply them to whomever, whatever or whenever is needed.

Uncomfortably and inconveniently, as soon as we bring God into our lives and let God shape our thinking, we encounter the enigmatic truth that rather than either/or a disturbing amount of life, the universe and reality is actually both/and. God is both three persons and one God. We are usually both sinners and saints. Compassion and the unity we are called to brings us into a community of faith where our identity in Christ is comprised as both us and them. In grace, boundaries and distinctions which might lead us to think about who is either in or out those classed as 'God's people' are dissolved by the reality that is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus [Galatians 3:8]. We are faithful and faithless. Although we are called in discipleship to love as God loves giving of ourselves as God gave of Godself in the person of Christ, we are both selfish self-less at the same time. We are both dead to sin and alive in Christ, yet the way we really live much of the time suggests that sin is alive and well in our living and we are too often dead to the way of Jesus.

It gets no better as we delve into the mysteries of the universe and how things work to create what we believe to be our reality. Things often turn out to be both/and rather than either/or. Light is both a wave and a 'particle' [although in physics it is more likely to be referred to as a quantum or packet of energy]. There are many theories and what has been held to be either true or not, which can now be described as both true and false, depending on one's relative perspective or position of observation.

Ethics, the consideration of what is more right and less wrong, in the complexity of life where situations can lead to things or actions being both right and wrong, rather than simply right or wrong. Where morals are in tension with each other there can be times where doing something which in a moral absolute would be considered wrong, can be also considered the right thing to do in the relative circumstances. Killing for example is universally held to be wrong, but there are many ethical debates about such instances as war or assisted dying, where a case can be made for it to be the right thing to do. The complexity of what can be both right and wrong can also apply to many of our doctrines and theology.

Jesus is both the Son of God and God incarnate. We can both know God whilst at the same time not knowing the reality of God. God is both transcendent (beyond our limits of perception) and immanent (perceivably close and near). Loving our neighbour is both simple to do and very hard at the same time. We can believe in God and at the same time have many doubts, just like the father of a boy who was wracked with secures and who came to Jesus asking for healing for his son (Mark 9:24). The reality is that many can be doing good, whilst at the same time be guilty of doing evil. It is not easy to categorise some things and less helpful to categorise people. This therefore is something that we can leave to God.

Jesus hits us with this calling to not judge unless we wish to be judged by the same measure (Matthew 7:1-3). In this we need to be clear that we are both to judge behaviour as right or wrong, both our own and others, and at the same time not make judgements of who is in or out of God's love, grace, mercy or communion as the Church. Paul's

letters are full of this complexity of both/and dualities, for he understood what is means to be human and to be in God and God's grace whilst at the same time not being able to live rightly or do what is good and proper in the way of Jesus. Romans 7:15-20 is a great example where he speaks about both knowing what is right and good and not being able to do it., where he writes, "I do not understand what I do. For what I want to do I do not do, but what I hate I do." We are both "dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus" [Romans 6:11] and yet, sin continue to live in us leading us to do wrongly and act un-rightly [Romans 7:17].

So, as Jesus once said, "you shall know the the truth shall free." [John8:32] The truth sets us firmly in a both/and reality. Things are not as clear-cut or as right and wrong as we, and this truth set us free from human-created boundaries and categories. We are freed in faith to give God the glory of judging, and our work becomes both reflecting on our own lives and what needs repenting and the work of joining God in God's mission by our using of our gifts and talents. Lent is a time for us to think about such things as we seek to re-invigorate our faith and discipleship on the journey towards the cross and resurrection.

Services at the Willow's


St. Matthew's is responsible for leading services at the Willow's on the 2nd Sunday and one fifth Sunday if there is one.
